On abortion

The debate over abortion has long been characterized by complete moral clarity on both sides. Many freedom-of-choice advocates would agree with the opinion recently published in this newsletter, "To me it's quite simple; if you don't believe in abortion, don't have one." On the other side, many anti-abortion advocates equate abortion with murder, thus justifying its prohibition.

Extremists on both sides ignore inconvenient facts. A fetus is neither an inert piece of meat, nor is it the same thing as a human being. A fetus is not a person, but it represents a potential person. This is why a miscarriage is often understood as an occasion for grief.

When we bring a child into the world, we should do so with the intention

of providing at least minimal physical and emotional care, to allow the child a reasonable chance to flourish. Sometimes a woman can foresee that continuing her pregnancy is likely to result in the creation of a person who will have a life of pain and misery. In such case, it is better that she abort her pregnancy, to minimize the suffering added to this world. Yes, a deliberate abortion is an occasion for grief, just as is a spontaneous abortion, and for the same reason: a potential human life has been terminated. But a deliberate abortion is much less a tragedy than bringing an innocent child into a life of suffering.
